#### DO YOU KNOW THE HISTORY OF HALLER'S "BLUE ARMY"?

General Józef Haller

As part of this year's 75th Anniversary Convention of the American Council for Polish Culture, (which is being held July 26 to 29 in Troy, Michigan), there will be a visit to the newly dedicated monuments erected at the Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield, Michigan honoring 59 members of the "Hallerczycy," the brave men who fought in World War I as part of General Józef Haller's "Blue Army."

As background, the emergence of the Blue Army was closely associated with the American entry into World War I in April 1917. A month earlier, Ignacy Jan Paderewski, world renowned pianist and future Prime Minister of the Polish Republic, submitted a proposal to the U.S. House of Representatives to accept Polish-American volunteers for service on the Western Front in the name of Poland's independence. Some 24,000 Poles were accepted (out of 38,000 who applied) and after brief military training in Canada, they, as well as many women volunteers (PSK), were sent to France to join General Jósef Haller and his forces.



Polish-Americans were eager to fight for freedom and American-style democracy because they themselves had escaped persecution a century earlier by the empires who partitioned Poland. Equipped by the French with "horizon blue" uniforms (a shade of blue-grey which refers to the indefinable color which separates the sky from the earth), this contingent became known as the *Hallerczycy of the Blue Army (Biękitna Armia)*. They fought under the command of General Józef Haller and served alongside U.S. and French forces in 1918, repelling a major German offensive that summer. In 1919, they were transported to Poland by train where they helped defend the newly independent Poland against its foes, including the Bolshevik Red Army, intent on overrunning Poland to spread communism across Europe.

In all, some 2,100 soldiers of the Blue Army who enlisted in France from the Polish diasporas died in the fighting, including over 50 officers serving with Haller. Over 1,600 men were wounded. Haller's army also included 25,000 ethnic Poles drafted against their will by the German and Austrian armies, out of 50,000 conscripts from across partitioned Poland. They joined Haller from the POW camps in Italy in 1919.

When their service ended, the Polish-Americans volunteers who served within Haller's Army were not recognized as veterans by either the American or Polish governments. This led to friction between the Polish community in the United States and the Polish government, and resulted in the subsequent refusal by Polish-Americans to help militarily with the Polish cause again. Some suffered from illness and injuries due to their service and had to depend on charity. The Polish Ladies Auxiliary No. 5 of the local Polish Army Veterans Association in America (known by its Polish initials as SWAP), helped care for their destitute comrades and purchased a plot of land at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield, Michigan to provide them with a dignified resting place when they passed away. Due to circumstances, however, many of the veterans' families were unable to afford grave markers of any kind.



Enter Henrietta Nowakowski of Dearborn Heights, Michigan and a long-time Board member of the ACPC who undertook a project to identify the veterans buried in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. Her father, Ignacy Zapytowski, was a Blue Army veteran and her mother, Aniela, had also worked as a recruiter for the Army. Both of her parents were active for decades in veteran's groups and in assisting Polish soldiers and veterans from both the First and Second World Wars. Henrietta researched the names and stories of the veterans, beginning with the records of her mother, who played an important role in the Women's Auxiliary Corps that purchased the site. She was assisted by the Polish Museum of America in Chicago, which holds many of the records of the Blue Army.

Henrietta's research proved invaluable to the Institute for National Remembrance, allowing them to create individual gravestones provided by the Polish government for each of the 59 forgotten heroes in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. An official dedication of a monument and tombstones will take place on June 17, 2023.

A permanent display of Haller's Blue Army can be found at the Polish Center of Discovery and Learning in Chicopee, MA, a new Supporting organization of the ACPC. It houses a number of primary source materials pertaining to Haller's Blue Army, including uniforms, and it continues to search for any and all materials that are relevant to this incredibly important but relatively little remembered chapter of Polish-American history. (The Museum also houses the Polish costume collection of our own Krystyna Słowikow-ska Farley, as well as the extraordinary collection of Polish Folk Art of Bernard Pajewski, a former PCCGH member.)
